## DAF Scholarship Program is Now Open to More Parker Youth

The Double Angel Foundation Scholarship Program has been expanded to include all area youth ages 5 to 18.

In recent history, four high school seniors were awarded scholarships to pursue their education. But the Foundation Board of Directors decided this year to refocus and expand the program in its effort to follow the DAF mission of making baseball accessible to all children.

"We don't want to see an enthusiastic, young, potential ballplayer not get to learn or continue playing baseball because the family is struggling financially, and we hope to offer assistance through this program," according to

the Board's announcement. "Our desire is to grow the game of baseball, one child at a time."

The Foundation hopes to spend up to \$7,000 each year, depending on financing and grants, to sponsor ballplayers, ages 5 to 18, who are in need of financial assistance. This scholarship can be used for high school baseball, special needs baseball programs and girls' softball.

The money will be awarded to the parents and the coach or recreation program. It can be used to cover registration fees, uniforms and equipment. Parents of applicants must return a copy of their 1040 tax return form; free or reduced lunch program documentation, if applicable; and a recommendation letter from a baseball coach or unrelated third party such as a principal, pastor or close friend.

Selected during an April meeting of the Double Angel Foundation Scholarship Committee and Board of Directors, the 2018 winners are:


 Luke Bailey, a Chaparral High School graduate who is studying hydrology at St. Cloud University.

## **KEYS TO CARBON** MONOXIDE SAFETY

The Double Angel Foundation was formed in honor of Dillon and Logan Dixey, two young brothers who tragically drowned in 2000 after being overcome by carbon monoxide (CO) while swimming at the rear of a houseboat on Lake Powell.

A major focus of that Foundation, founded by parents Ken and Bambi Dixey, is a nationwide campaign to raise awareness on the dangers of carbon monoxide poisoning on houseboats.

To help in that effort, here is information from the U.S. Coast Guard on ways to help keep CO from poisoning you, your passengers and others while you are boating.

- Know where and how CO may accumulate in and around your boat. This can include:
  - ♦ Inadequately ventilated canvas enclosures.
  - ♦ Exhaust gas that is trapped in enclosed places.
  - ♦ Blocked exhaust outlets.
  - ♦ Another vessel's exhaust.
  - ♦ At slow speeds, while idling or stopped. Be aware that CO can remain in or around your boat at dangerous levels even if your engine or a nearby boat's engine is no longer running.
- Maintain fresh air circulation throughout the boat at all times. Run exhaust blowers whenever the generator is operating.
- Know where your engine and generator exhaust outlets are located and keep everyone away from these areas.
- Never sit, teak surf or hang on the back deck or swim platform while the engines are running. Teak surfing is NEVER a safe activity.
- Never enter areas under swim platforms where exhaust outlets are located unless the area has been properly ventilated.
- Although CO can be present without the smell of exhaust fumes, if you smell exhaust fumes, CO is also present. Take immediate action to dissipate these fumes.
- Treat symptoms of seasickness as possible CO poisoning. Get the person into fresh air immediately. Seek medical attention unless you're sure it's not CO.
- Install and maintain CO alarms inside your boat. Do not ignore any alarm. Replace alarms as recommended by the alarm manufacturer.
- Get a Vessel Safety Check. A VSC is a free bow-to-stern safety examination.
